As we recite this litany, hold the stone within your hand as you pray, respond to each petition with the words, "We will honor and make space on this sacred ground."

L: In the hallowed spaces we inhabit, we recognize the historical and ongoing injustices faced by marginalized communities. We confess our active and passive roles in perpetuating these harms.

C: We will honor and make space on this sacred ground.

L: We voice deep regret for the times when our silence allowed injustice to prevail, instead of using our voices to champion equality. We repent for our failures in challenging discrimination and exclusion.

C: We will honor and make space on this sacred ground

L: We commit to meaningful actions grounded in prayer, education, and repentance, reflecting the diverse tapestry that shapes Ohio synods and our communities. We pledge to actively work towards creating spaces within our congregations that honor diversity, promote inclusion, and uphold justice. **C: We will honor and make space on this sacred ground.**

L: In seeking reconciliation, we strive for a world where power is shared, and every person can thrive. We envision our synods and congregations as sacred spaces where all are welcomed, all are valued, and all can contribute. C: We will honor and make space on this sacred ground.

L: As we journey forward, we remember that fostering inclusivity is not a one-time act, but a continuous process of learning, unlearning, and reimagining. Inspired by hope, guided by love, and sustained by our commitment, we strive to create a more equitable and just world.

C: We will honor and make space on this sacred ground.

L: In the spirit of unity and community, we recognize the strength found in our diversity, and we commit to embracing this diversity fully. May we be a beacon of God's love, reflecting God's embrace of all humanity in our actions and our ministries.

C: We will honor and make space on this sacred ground.

L: I now call upon each of us to enter into a moment of quiet reflection and prayer. As you hold this stone in your hands, ponder upon the ways we have both knowingly and unknowingly contributed to the harm of others. Let this stone you hold be a concrete reminder of the promises made in your prayers today - a symbol of your commitment to bring about change, unity, and healing.

(Instrumental music plays while this quiet meditative prayer is recited. Assembly is silently holding their stones.)

Response: In the quiet stillness of this moment, I invite you all to take a deep, cleansing breath. As you exhale, allow your body to relax, releasing any tensions that may have found a home within you. You may choose to close your eyes or soften your gaze, allowing your focus to turn inwards as you hold your stone. Perhaps place your hands in a position that feels comfortable and calming to you.

As we stand in the presence of God, let us remember that we are standing on sacred ground. This is hallowed earth that has been blessed by the footsteps of countless souls who've journeyed before us. We are standing on the shoulders of those who've gone before, those who have sown seeds of faith, hope, and love, paving the way for us to continue their journey.

Imagine the vastness of the future that lies before us. It is a landscape wide and expansive, filled with endless possibilities. Let justice be our compass, guiding us along the winding paths of this vast expanse. Each step we take, each decision we make, contributes to the legacy we leave behind for those who will follow in our footsteps.

As we stand on this sacred ground, let us reflect on how we can honor it, today and every day. How can our actions, our words, our thoughts, align with the values of love, peace, and compassion? How can we contribute to the sanctity of this ground, enhancing its sacredness with our own acts of faith and kindness?

I invite you to hold these reflections in your heart, as we contemplate our role in honoring this sacred ground and the stories that rest upon it, today and forever

more. In the silence that follows, listen for the whispers of wisdom that echo from the depths of your soul, guiding you towards your own unique ways of honoring this holy space.

Together let us release this prayer as we say... C: We will honor and make space on this sacred ground. Amen.

Four Directions Prayer

A Four Direction Prayer comes from a way that many Native American people pray to connect deeply with both God and all creation. There are many different tribes of Native people, and many ways that people say this prayer. But that is what makes this prayer special. No matter how this is prayed, the most important part is that you pray from deep in your heart. This is a great way to start and end each day.

L: Creator, the strength of the people, we honor you. Listen to the thoughts of your people. We respect the truth of your spirit and care for your Creations to the east, to the south, to the west and to the north. We honor you by deeds and not words. We live by the ways you have entrusted to us within the circle of life. Come Great Spirit as we gather in your name.

(We turn our bodies to the Four Directions as we pray the following prayers. Begin by turning toward the East and continue to turn, with each prayer, in a clockwise direction.)

L: We face East: To your symbol color gold, The place of dawning, there is beauty in the morning, there the Seeker finds new visions as each sacred day is born. All who honor life around them, all who honor life within, shall shine with light and glory when the morning comes again. And we pray, C: Come Holy Creator's Spirit, Come

L: We turn to the South: To your symbol color red, In the South, the place of growing there is wisdom in the earth, Both the painful song of dying and joyful song of birth. As the earth gives up her lifeblood so her children's hearts may beat. We give back to her our reverence for the holy ground beneath our feet. And we pray, **C: Come Holy Creator's Spirit, Come**

L: We turn to the West: To your symbol color black, The place of seeing, the birth of visions of the of the servants, who proclaimed the Gospel to us. Guide us at the end of each day and fill us with your peace. And we pray, **C: Come Holy Creator's Spirit, Come**

L: We turn to the North: To your symbol color white, We look to God our Creator who cleanses our earth with snow, wind, and rain. Creator who fills us with the wideness of mercy and grace and lovingly embraces all the people. And to the Spirit who comes to inspire us. And we pray, C: Come Holy Creator's Spirit, Come
